

Child Progress Year 12 Chance Exam Results

Goat breeding & handover program

SCAI has been running a goat breeding programme since 2017. Initially, 18 families from the education scholarship programme attended 3-day goat rearing training. Then each participant received two pregnant, vaccinated, insured female goats. When the first two female goats were born from these, they were passed on to another family, and the cycle has continued since.

There are now 77 households that received 2 goats. 92 goats have been passed on to other families so far. There are now almost 73 pregnant goats.

Start and Improve Your Business (SIYB) Training

As usual, we are continuing to enhance the knowledge and skills of the parents/ caretakers of our sponsored children so they become self-reliant and able to provide adequate support for their children as and when required.

To accomplish these goals, we organized "Start and Improve Your Business" (SIYB) refresher training this quarter, where parents were oriented as to how to identify feasible businesses at the local level and how to start and run a new business successfully. 5 Men and 5 Women attended the SIYB training from Betini.

This quarter, we organized 1 vegetable farming training, focusing on mushroom farming. 10 men and 6 women participated in the skill training from Betini.

Case stories Child Progress



Jit Bahadur Tamang, 16 years old lives with his mother, brother, a sister-in-law,

and younger brother. He lost his father in the 2015 earthquake. After his father's death, the problems at home increased significantly. His mother practiced farming and sometimes took on labour jobs in the village. With no other sources of income, his mother found it very hard to educate her children, and Jit Bahadur almost dropped out of school.

SCAI Australia then sponsored him in 2018. As a result, his studies improved significantly. With this support, consistently passed his classes with firstdivision results. He also began participating in extracurricular activities at school and attended various capacitybuilding training programs conducted by the organization.

Jit Bahadur passed class 9 with 1st division and he is now studying class 10. He also recently passed the first term exam of class 10 with 1st division. He aims to become an Army Officer in the future.

Family Progress



Tok Bahadur Tamang, 53, lives with his wife, one son, one daughter, two granddaughters, one niece, and one nephew. His younger brother went to India

and since then he has not returned home and has gone missing, his sister-in-law remarried. Since then, he has been raising his niece and nephew; Sukumaya and Rajesh.

Previously he was engaged in traditional farming, but with limited land, he often had to buy food. It was difficult for him to manage household expenses and fund the children's education. He also worked as a daily labourer. Due to such poor financial condition, his son dropped out of school in the middle of class 10. His daughter-in-law passed away in the 2015 earthquake. Both he and his son were struggling hard to run their household.

His niece and nephew Rajesh and Sukumaya were then selected for an educational scholarship provided by SCAI Australia. He then joined Golphu saving group, a group formed by the project, and began saving an amount of 100 NPR every month.

Tok Bahadur had the opportunity to participate in various training programs, such as Start and Improve Your Business, skill training; vegetable farming, poultry farming, goat farming, and buffalo rearing, which were instrumental in inspiring him to launch his own business.

To finance his venture, he received a loan of 50,000 NPR from Golphu Saving Group, which he invested in buying five goats.

After one year, he sold the 4 goats and earned 45,000 NPR in a year. With the earnings from goat rearing, he purchased a buffalo and increased his number of goats. He earned 80,000 NPR from goat selling and 60,000 NPR from buffalo selling in 2024. He currently has 12 goats and 2 buffaloes.
